1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Govt. Swami Atmanand Post Graduate College, Narayanpur (C. G.) is located at the entrance of the tribal area of Abujhmad. It was established on 14 Sept. 1988 under Adiwasi Vikas Yojana by the department of higher education, Govt. of Madhya Pradesh. At that time an undergraduate program started in the tribal rest house and over to last 15 years, the college is functioning through the same building. At that time the college was affiliated with Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur. The college was registered under sections 2f and 12B of the UGC Act in the year 1992. At the time of its inception, the total number of regular students enrolled in the discipline of Arts was only 157. The main objective of Narayanpur College is to provide higher education in this backward & rural area (Abujhmad Tribal Zone) of the Chhattisgarh state. From the academic year 2001-02, a Bachelor Degree Program in Commerce & year 2005-06 Science were started. Gradually, it progressed and made its own identity in providing education in SCIENCE, COMMERCE, COMPUTER & ARTS at 'Graduation level'.

Now Govt. College Narayanpur has been renamed as Govt. Swami Atmanand Post Graduate College, Narayanpur, affiliated to Shahid Mahendra Karma University, Bastar (C.G.). In addition to it, The College holds in its profile, five Postgraduate Courses namely M.A. (Geography), M.A. (Economics), M.A. (Sociology), and M.A. (Political Science), M.A. (Hindi). It is now shifted to its new large campus of nearly 20 acres, situated beside the natural beautiful lush green area. M.Sc. Chemistry will also be opening in the next session 2022-23. It will be the first Post Graduate Program in science.

"NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (NSS)" is a unit of the college, consisting of 100 students. NSS office Conducts, directs, guides, and controls the "NSS CAMP Program." Two more units NATIONAL CADET CORPS (NCC) and RED CROSS SOCIETY are also conducted in college. NCC, NSS, and Red Cross have been spent on different activities to create awareness for social work. NSS unit conducts regular activities cleaning, gardening, and swachhta awareness program for students and societies. They also arrange the NSS camp program. Broadband internet connection with wi-fi computer lab is also present. The office room is also equipped with wi-fi. The College library is having E-resources, magazines, and newspapers which are regularly purchased.

All information about payable fees structure, admission rules and guidelines, scholarship details, student relief fund, disciplinary rules, attendance, and admission form format is available and provided by the college office. All information is notified timely on the college notice board.

The process of learning is a dynamic process, with everybody guessing as to where it will go next. This is the reason why we have set our sights high and provide quality series in this field. And therefore, it goes without saying that our faculty is well qualified and experienced to provide students the quality education, and personal attention. The fee structure is also flexible and competitive to allow everyone an opportunity of availing themselves of a world-class.

6. Maximum students are from rural areas and backward communities.
7. Some of the faculty have publications in renowned journals.
8. Science departments have their own laboratory.
9. Students are sincere and hard-working.
10. Departments regularly conduct an interactive sessions, group discussions, internal unit tests, seminars, etc.

Institutional Weakness

1. The college is located in the rural Naxal affected area therefore most of the students are coming from low socioeconomic status.
2. No separate departmental library and limited departmental infrastructure.
3. No Placement.
4. Department lacks in revenue generation.
5. Fewer students pursuing higher education.
6. Involvement of Alumni at the departmental level is less.
7. Department facing fewer faculty members.

8. The students do not have adequate or basic knowledge of the subject at the time of admission.

Institutional Opportunity

1. Students can get fellowships from INSPIRE, UGC which will help them to get ahead in their careers.
2. Students can get government jobs and can also join the industries and the companies and many more.
3. Providing quality education to the society of economically backward classes.
4. Participation of Government officers and social workers as the resource persons in the teaching of some chapters to the students in the college.
5. To create awareness about various social and economic problems among the students and the society.
6. To participate in welfare activities.
7. After completing the UG and PG courses the students can join the other universities and institutions for higher education.

Institutional Challenge

1. Govt. Swami Atmanand Post Graduate College is situated in the very remote area of Baster, Chhattisgarh state. Therefore, basic facilities are not in good condition like good books, internet, travel, medical and fund.
2. To introduce the interdisciplinary courses.
3. To introduce the career-oriented courses.
4. It is difficult to introduce the research attitude among the students.
5. To improve the communication skills in English as well as in Hindi among the students.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college is affiliated with Shaheed Mahendra Karma University, Bastar, and approved by the Government of Chhattisgarh and UGC, New Delhi. Presently the college is running the undergraduate programs in the streams of B.A., B.Sc., B.Com., B.C.A. and offers a diploma in computer applications. Moreover, five postgraduate programs in the subjects of Economics, Sociology, Political Science, Geography, and Hindi are running smoothly in the college. Importantly, Environmental science, Hindi, and English language are compulsory subjects at the UG level in all the faculties. The college offers six subject combinations at UG Level in Arts faculty. The syllabus of the courses is prepared by the Board of studies of Shaheed Mahendra Karma University, Bastar.

The principal monitors the effective implementation of the Academic Calendar through formal meetings with the Head of Departments and if necessary, through informal discussions with the faculty. There is optimum utilization of well-equipped laboratories for curriculum delivery of practicals. The faculty uses audio-visual aids like charts, maps, and models, including chalk and board during teaching, and the methods like seminars, group discussions, quizzes, and case studies for effective delivery of the curriculum. The study materials, notes, and question banks are provided to the students in the class and Whatsapp groups. Online platform such as YOUTUBE, E-PG Pathshala, e-Gyan Kosh, etc. is being used for effective teaching. The college encourages the faculty to participate in Orientation and Refresher courses to update their knowledge of the subject.

The college strongly believes in integrating cross-cutting issues relevant to professional ethics, gender, human values, environment, and sustainability to ensure the holistic development of the students. The college is trying to collect the valuable suggestion and feedback of the students, alumni, and the parents so as to progress more in various aspects. The College is trying to confer the facilities of seats as per the growing number of students and the inclusion of new courses that may raise employability for the students. Holistic education is the need of society, so the college has three active units of NCC, NSS, and Youth Red Cross for boys and girls.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Govt. Swami Atmanand Post Graduate College follows the policies stated by the Department of Higher education, Govt. of Chhattisgarh. The institution admits students from all sections of society and the mechanism of admission is transparent and student-friendly. The admissions to various classes or programs are made in accordance with the procedures prescribed by the state government and Shaheed Mahendra Karma University, Bastar, Chhattisgarh. Notification regarding admission is displayed on the college notice boards as well as on the college website, (www.gdcnarayanpur.com) for helping students to get easy access to the admission process. Online form filling facility, as well as the declaration of merit list on college notice boards, helps in maintaining transparency. To make a better understanding of the selection of subjects, the counseling of the students at the entry level is also organized by the admission committee of the college. Admission in all courses is made through merit in the qualifying examination with the special concession to socially backward sections of the society in accordance with the reservation rule of the CG Government. To cater to the diverse needs of the students, various subject combinations are offered so that the students can choose the subjects according to their interests. A help desk has been made for providing assistance to students regarding the selection of subjects as well as solving any query regarding admission. Students from all categories (ST, SC, OBC, GENERAL) and with multi-cultural backgrounds are being admitted to the college. During the last five years, there is an increase in the number of SC and ST student admissions. The college has enhanced the teaching-learning of students through various activities organized by subject teachers such as group discussions, essays, debates, quiz competitions, role play, etc for the students. Continuous internal evaluation is done through unit tests, half-yearly and model examinations. The 20 marks are allotted for internal assessment and seminars for PG students. Internal assessment exams are conducted as per the Shaheed Mahendra Karma University, Bastar, Jagdalpur, and according to the dates scheduled in Academic Calendar. University exams have been conducted as per the norms of the university. As per the rules of affiliating university, there is a provision for photocopy, re-totaling, and revaluation of the answer sheets at the undergraduate level from the University.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The research and innovation activities of the college are not in a good state because the college is located in the Naxal affected area. There are five master's programs in Hindi, Geography, Economics, Political Science, and Sociology running in the college but the master's programs have not yet opened in the subjects of science and commerce. Also, research activities cannot be carried out in the college as there are 1 or 2 professors in every department. The principal (geography department) and two faculty (one in chemistry and another in the Hindi department) are having Ph.D. and two faculty members are having M.Phil. Due to the lack of research facilities in the college, they are not able to continue their research work.

Our college is having one unit each of NSS, NCC, and Red Cross Society. All of them are involved in extension activities. NSS unit of our college pays heed to the health and hygiene of local tribe people. SVEEP

Program, under the NSS unit, is working hard on creating the interest of voters in elections. The local people were made aware of the right to vote.

The Red Ribbon club under the NSS unit created an AIDS awareness program for the local tribe people. The students and faculty members of the unit have been made aware of HIV as this area is mostly affected by HIV. Various activities like poster making, painting, rangoli, and speeches on AIDS awareness are being organized by the Red Ribbon Club. In the last two years, our students campaigned for the COVID-19 awareness program.

The second and most important NCC unit emphasizes discipline and unity among the students as the college lies in a fully Naxal affected area. The students are continuously involved in making good relations with tribal people with the police.

The dedicated faculty and students of the NCC unit help in developing the feeling of patriotism among the local people and their family members. They are trying to bridge the gap between the police force and local people and also associating them with the mainstream so that local people do not get involved in Naxal activities.

The Third unit is Red Cross Society. The members of this unit have created an awareness program on how to stop the spread of malaria disease, the Covid-19 Prevention Program, and the Covid-19 vaccination Program.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has sufficient infrastructure facilities to support the teaching and learning process. The college has a total of 20-acre areas in which the college building, cycle stand, staff quarters and guest house, etc have been built. All the students are motivated to participate in the cultural, sports, and other extra-curricular activities. The college library has sufficient books to provide the students which help them in their learning and also help the teachers with their teaching. The college has a computer lab with 25 computers connected with LAN (Local Area Network) network including a wi-fi facility. It helps the students to search for important information and use e-resources in their studies. There are three smart classes in the college which help to create an attractive environment for the teaching and learning process and one seminar hall is also there with a projector.

Broadband internet connection with wi-fi computer lab is also there. The office room is also equipped with wi-fi. The college library is having E-resources, magazines, and newspapers which are regularly purchased. A policy and systematic procedure have been followed by the college for the purchasing and maintenance of physical and academic support facilities like maintenance of computers, printers, photocopy machines, buildings, furniture, laboratories, library, sports, electricity supply, etc. The automation of library housekeeping activities is going on with the help of library automation software SOUL 2.0 and for e-resources like e-journals and e-books, N-LIST (National Library Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content) has been subscribed from January 2021. Allotment of budget from the Government, RUSA, and UGC has been spent on infrastructure augmentation and other maintenance works like maintenance on physical facility and the academic facility has been done by the head of Jan Bhagidari Scheme (JBS) and PD. The budget received for NCC, NSS, and Red Cross has been spent on different activities to create awareness for social work.

Student Support and Progression

The college has a well-defined and independent system for student support and mentoring. The system works in close association with all the stakeholders to ensure the all-round development of the students. The teachers as

guardians are responsible and accountable for the welfare of their students. Teachers keep records of student attendance, internal assessment, and result analysis. Students belonging to ST/SC/OBC in Naxal affected areas are also being given admission to the college and all the necessary facilities are being provided to them with a special focus on sensitive dealing and personal counseling such students. They get scholarships from the state government as well as from NMDC.

Various committees have been formed to coordinate student mechanisms such as Grievance Redressal Committee, Anti Ragging Committee, Janbhagidari Committee, and Sexual Harassment Committee.

The college believes in youth empowerment through quality education. The institution also engages students in various extracurricular activities, the most popular amongst them being sports, cultural activities, NCC, NSS, and Youth Red Cross. The student representatives encourage and motivate other students to participate in student's-oriented programs such as Independence Day, Voters Day, Yoga Day, Environment Day, Debate Competition, Rangoli Competition, Essay Writing Competition, etc. Student representatives assist teachers in making such events successful. The NSS unit having the student representatives also ensures to maintain discipline in the college by encouraging students to follow the rules and regulations laid down by the college and insist other students maintain a green and plastic-free campus.

The college website provides complete information regarding the no. of faculties, non-teaching staff, subjects taught, seat availability in each program, admission schedule, and rules & regulations, etc.

Alumni:

There is no Alumni Association in the institution. Registration for it is in the process. The college created a WhatsApp group of Alumni on 30 Nov 2019 through which we get feedback from them. By analyzing their fruitful suggestions, we always try to implement them for the betterment of the students. If ex-students get the job whether in govt. sector or in the private sector, they inform us happily and other students of the group are inspired by them. The ex-students after getting a job whether in govt. sector or in the private sector come to the college and become a source of inspiration for other students in the college.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Govt. Swami Atmanand Post Graduate College, Narayanpur is a government college therefore it is governed as per state government rules. College emphasizes providing high-quality education, employment education, character development, and personality development for the tribal youth. The college focuses on many aspects like the enrichment of Laboratories and promoting students in the cultural activities and sports field to develop their emotional intelligence.

For the proper functioning of the institute and promotion of participative management, the institute runs on a decentralized management operative process, wherein different committees have been framed by the principal in the governance of the institute. Such decentralized and participative management leads to a situation of harmony and a congenial atmosphere in the institute for the development of the students.

The quality policy of the college is to encourage the faculty members to attend orientation, refresher programs, seminars, and conference workshops for their upliftment and improve their teaching and knowledge. IQAC has

made constant efforts to shift from the traditional teacher-centric approach to a student-centric approach.

College implements the welfare measures or schemes and annual performance appraisal system of the state government effectively. Faculty members and non-teaching staff both are regulated to fill up performance appraisal forms provided to them, designed by the directorate of higher education C.G. govt.

An external audit is conducted by the audit department of the state directorate and accountant general of the state from time to time. The funds received from the state government are utilized strictly as per the instructions and conditions specified with the provision of funds. Likewise, the UGC grants are utilized by the regulation and guidelines issued by the UGC. The RUSA funds are also utilized as per the concerned instructions. The Janbhagidari resources are utilized for the urgent needs of the academic and infrastructural development of the college. In a nutshell, all the funds are utilized keeping in view the enhancement of the academic quality and strengthening of the infrastructure of the institute.

The Internal quality assurance cell (IQAC) was constituted in college for quality enhancement and monitoring of academic as well as administrative activities. The IQAC creates an academic environment on the college campus. The IQAC has contributed significantly to institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes in the institution. Continuous development is attempted through IQAC at periodic intervals. It is responsible for directing developing providing and implementing guidelines to review curricular, instructional, teaching, and learning materials. latest teaching aids, techniques, activities assessment tools, and methodologies are used to enhance overall functioning to achieve the goals of the institute.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

The Institution has a streamlined mechanism for continuous monitoring and evaluation of the students. At the beginning of the session, the slow learners and the advanced learners are identified during classroom teaching, interaction with students, and in the first terminal examination. Measures taken for different students are given below:

Measures for Slow Learners:

The slow learners are given extra coaching for theory and practice in the zero hours. doubts classes are organized by all the departments to solve all the problems and doubts of the slow learners. Study materials are provided to them to improve their basic understanding of the subject. The progress of the slow learners is also apprised to the parents through Parent-Teacher Meet organized by Institute departments. Video lectures prepared by the faculty members are available on the college website and e classroom is accessible to the students. Question banks with model answers have been prepared by all the departments. The link to the study material is also made available to the students in their departmental WhatsApp group. The students can read them on their tips. A copy of the answer sheets of meritorious students is provided to the students as a sample for their improvement in writing in the examination.

Measures for Advanced Learners:

Quick learners are identified through their performance in examinations, and interaction in the classroom and laboratory. To enhance their fundamental knowledge, concept understanding and articulation abilities, etc., the Extra books and study material is provided to the advanced learners. The institution has a policy for a fee exemption for toppers Special coaching, seminars, workshops, and PD sessions are organized regularly for the advanced learners. E-books for competitive exams are available in the e-library, especially for advanced learners, which they can access through their mobile also. Apart from these, the college has also launched other initiatives to facilitate and promote learning and motivate the students to achieve the highest :

Best Library User award for books and e-books separately is given every year by the institution under only one category "Students" to promote learning. 2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

The Experiential Learning Method:

It seeks the truth through personal and collective experience for which personal involvement is indispensable. Students are encouraged to share their perceived and real experiences during classroom teaching related to that topic. Students are asked to perceive that class extends beyond the college where students get firsthand knowledge. A field trip or excursion is also a very powerful experiential learning method for the students of various disciplines. The science department takes its students to fields and sites to improve their knowledge about botanical plants and various insects and animals found in the fields nearby the surroundings.

Participatory Learning Method:

It requires the participation of students as a seeker of scientific facts, natural laws, or social theories wherein he or she tries to imbibe theoretical knowledge into real life. Participation is either individual or collective and initially requires systematic training to understand the reality. Students' participation is also visible in the handmade posters, charts, models, and PowerPoint presentations with the help of a projector. Group discussion, role-play, and case study is also practiced.

Students give their presentations using PowerPoint in various departments (Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Commerce, Economics, and Geography) to boost their confidence and understanding of that topic.

Problem-Solving Method:

Quite often students confront various problems in perceiving and understanding the intricacies of the topic in the classrooms. Such academic issues are resolved by the concerned teacher in the classroom through guidance in simple, lucid, and uncomplicated language, citing various examples. Topic-related problems of the students are solved with the help of reference books, websites, hand notes, group discussions, seminars, etc. Illustrating the topic through models, charts, and experiments also solves the classroom problems of the students. Sometimes lectures by experts from other colleges are also organized. Specialized seminars and workshops have also been organized in this college.

Experimental Method:

Experiments are integrated with the subjects of science as practical papers. The students of science are

taught the topics with a lot of practical experiments in physics, chemistry, botany, and zoology. Such experiments and practices act as a foundation stone of their skill and knowledge and in shaping their careers. A practical paper has been included in the geography syllabus also.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

Evaluation is an integral part of the teaching-learning process of this college with an objective of gradual refinement in the process of the academic outcome. The mechanism of internal assessment of the students is quite logical and follows a coherent pattern.

- During the first few lectures the students are made aware of the annual examination pattern held by the university, and also the internal evaluation mechanism consisting of unit tests quarterly examinations, half-yearly examinations, and pre-final examinations.
- Each department conducts the unit tests, and also collects feedback from students, and evaluates the quality of teaching-learning. There is a separate department to conduct these internal exams and annual exams.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

In the case of internal examination, an examination-related timetable is decided by an institution and displayed on the notice board. To ensure proper conduct of examination two invigilators are assigned in each exam room. If the examinee has any grievance arising during the process of internal evaluation one is free to discuss the matter with the subject teacher. The matter is resolved based on academic facts. If a student is not able to appear in the exam due to medical or any other genuine reason, the internal examination is conducted for that student as per norms, provided he submits an application to the subject teacher. The grievance of the students related to assessment is made clear by showing/her performance on the answer sheet.

With reference to external examination evaluation, if a student scores fewer marks than expected he/she can apply for revaluation of his/her answer sheet after paying the prescribed fee, University provides the photocopies of their answer sheets to students. If the student feels that the evaluation is not correct, he/she can apply for revaluation.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

In the beginning stage, this college was started in a social building at Bakharupara having some small rooms. After 14 years in 2003, the college has been shifted to the Kumharpara area. The college campus was having 25 acres of land on which the building has been constructed. The college building was having nine Classrooms and one each of the Library, Geography Lab, Botany Lab, Zoology Lab, Physics Lab, Chemistry Lab, a separate Common room for girls, a Staffroom, a Principal room, and an Office room. After shifting of college to its new building, the number of the students increased day by day. The teaching-learning facility is increasing in the college and some additional facilities are also added. One seminar hall is also available in this college for organizing seminars, for the arrangement of any meeting program organized by the NCC/NSS, and other departments of the college.

In the year 2018, the college got the additional two floor buildings from the RUSA fund. The new building has 8 big rooms in which 4 rooms are classrooms and 3 rooms are well equipped with smart class and one room is used for computer Lab with internet facility and 1 room is used for Chemistry Lab. The college is also having a two-set public address system and one projector in the Seminar Hall. There are 37 computers in the college. The college always tries to increase the physical facility for the students day by day. There are separate toilet rooms for boys and girls students in both buildings of the college. There are 10 staff quarters behind the college building which include F type (01), G type (03), H type (04), and I type (02). A guest room is also available in the college to provide accommodation facilities for the visiting faculty. A cycle stands for students and a vehicle stand for college staff is also there. IQAC room for NAAC coordinator and staff room for all the college staff is available there, where staff can sit in their free period. One guard room and one sports room are also there in the college. The construction of toilets and a ramp from the ground floor to the second floor has been done for physically challenged students.

The college has a beautiful garden in front of the college building in which different types of flowering plants have been planted. On the college campus, different types of fruits bearing trees and other medicinal plants have been also planted. Trees help us to keep our environment fresh and healthy. They also help in providing fresh air and make the college building attractive. The whole college campus is surrounded by a boundary wall.

For this, a stage has been made inside the college building which is used for multi-purpose activities. The college Library is just like a workshop for the students. Not every student either rich or poor can purchase every reading material which is required by them to fulfill their educational needs. That's why libraries play a very important role to fulfill the information needs of every student of the college by using their resources. Approximately 19,424 books are available in our college library including text, reference novels, competitive books, etc. Apart from books, the library also ensures the regular purchase of newspapers in both Hindi and English for improving awareness and keeping up to date with the incidents and other general information. The library also subscribes to the Employment News and other magazines to fulfill the current and latest information needs of the users. The magazines which are purchased by the library are India Today, Yojana, Kurukshetra, Vigyan Pragati, Vikash Parakh, Pratiyogita Darpan, Target Times, and two Employment News- Rojgar Samachar and Rojgar Niyojan.

To automate the library our college purchased ILMS Software SOUL 2.0 in March 2020 and got it installed after purchasing the computer system in October 2020. The work of data entry is going on. The library has been used by the student daily on every working day. But there is no reading room for the student inside the library, the student can read the book outside in front of the library. A proposal for making a separate library building including a reading hall has been sent to the district administration. We hope that it may be built in the future. A library orientation program has been organized for the new academic session students to make them familiar with the library staff and with the library resources & services.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 Institution frequently updates its IT facilities including Wi-Fi

Response:

Today is the era of information communication and information technology. It is very important for the college to adopt an ICT facility for quick access to information. In the present situation, it is said that a country that is rich in information, is also rich in the socio-economic spheres. Narayanpur district is called the 'Entrance Gate for Abujhmad' the whole district is surrounded by the forest. The internet connectivity and mobile networks were very poor till 2016. There was a single mobile network provided by BSNL. At that time even the mobile networks had been disconnected for one and/or two days. It was very difficult to use internet service via mobile phone but after the Sanchar Kranti Scheme came in 2018, Smart Mobile phones were distributed to the college students by the State Government and during the same period, one more mobile network that is Reliance Jio started providing internet and mobile network services. In 2020 our college got broadband connectivity for providing internet facilities in the college and to improve the IT facility for the college.

For this our college has also set up a computer lab with 25 Computer connected to the internet using a local area network (LAN) connection. Our College provides 30 minutes for every student for access to the internet. They are using this facility for their information needs related to their course of study and also other reading materials.

In the session 2019-20, our college has changed three general classrooms into smart classrooms for making an attractive teaching-learning process. Wi-Fi facility is also available in our college. Apart from this, some departments have their desktop connected with internet facilities for access to e-resources and for other work. The office has three computer systems connected with an internet facility for the purpose of office-related work and for making pay bills of the college staff. To provide the internet facility to the students of the college, a Wi-Fi set up has been installed by the Chips but it is not started till now. By using the smartboard, students can see video lectures, and demonstrations for practices related to subjects like Chemistry, Geography, Botany, Zoology, Computer Science, Physics, etc. Sometimes motivational videos are also shown to the students for motivating them in difficult situations.

Our college is a government college that is run by the state government according to the rule of the Department of Higher Education. The Department provides financial assistance to the college and the college spends the allotted amount by purchasing the required items and repairing the old items which were purchased earlier. Our institution always follows the purchase rules of the government of Chattisgarh for purchasing new equipment, machines, etc.

The College principal has made a purchase committee consisting of three members. Quotation and tender methods are used for the purchase of the goods. The grants which are received from the state government, UGC, or JBS are used to increase the physical facility for the student. The state government provides some additional facilities to the students belonging to the SC, ST, and BPL categories.

The maintenance of the laboratory has been done by the laboratory in charge with the help of lab technicians and lab attendants. A library advisory committee has been constituted under the chairmanship of the college Principal. The college librarian and two other members gave useful suggestions for the betterment of library services and library collections. It helps the library to provide better services to its users. The maintenance of the sports ground has been done under the guidance of the college sports officer. The classroom maintenance and its cleanness have been done by the college sweeper and peons. The maintenance of the college building and electricity wiring supply has been done by the PWD department.

The maintenance of academic support facilities like maintenance of computer system, Xerox machine, table chairs, printers, blackboard, and the whiteboard has been done by the PD account or by Jan Bhagidari Samiti. These all maintenance work has been done by local workers. The college garden and the trees have been taken care of and maintained by a gardener.

The college implements the state Government annual performance appraisal system for teaching and non-

teaching staff. Both faculty members and non-teaching staff are regulated to fill up performance appraisal forms provided to them, designed by the directorate of higher education C.G. govt. by 31st March at the end of every financial year. The format prescribed to the teaching staff has been so designed that it covers all the activities taken up by the faculty member throughout the academic year i.e. teaching students, Organizing seminars/workshops in the college, enrollment in games and sports conducted in the college, examination duties valuation works, their involvement in curricular designing in various Board of studies and university Bodie, etc. The daily teaching diary and attendance registers are checked at monthly levels and are also viewed in the annual appraisal report. The annual appraised format filled by the faculty members is assessed by the Principal who makes the necessary and important remarks and then sends them to the State Directorate for final assessment. These appraisal reports are reviewed by the departmental promotion committee during the promotion of the faculties.

Faculty performance is also appraised through a student feedback mechanism related to the teaching methods of the teacher his abilities to communicate and transfer his knowledge to students, complete the course, etc. The same is intimated to the concerned teacher for suggestions or recommendations for improvement if any. Non-teaching staff of the college like the Principal, Librarian, Sports Officer, Office Staff, and supporting staff are also required to fill up a performance appraisal form specially designed for them and assessed annually, and sent to the state directorate.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources**Response:**

This college is a govt. funded institution; Therefore, a substantial part of our financial needs is met with the finances made available by the higher education department of the Chhattisgarh state government Besides bearing the salary cost for the staff working the state govt. also provides funds for library and laboratory Purchases of books/journals and Scientific instruments. The cost of maintaining the college building, including the hostel building, is borne by the public works department of the state govt. The college is registered under the 2 (f) and 12(B) sections of the UGC ACT 1956. Consequently, the college receives regular grants from the UGC under various heads. Besides the funds received from the state govt. and UGC, The college mobilizes funds under the Janbhagidari Scheme. Besides the above sources of funds, a part of fees charged from the students also forms a portion of our finances. The college also receives funds from the central govt. under the Rashtriya Uchchattar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) Scheme of strengthening the infrastructural capacity of higher educational institutions.

Utilization:

As far as utilization of the received funds is concerned, we have a clear and transparent approach toward it. All the expenditures are spent keeping in view the academic and infrastructural requirements of the institution. The funds received from the state government are utilized strictly as per the instructions and conditions specified with the provision of funds. Likewise, the UGC grants are utilized by the regulation and guidelines issued by the UGC. The RUSA funds are also utilized as per the concerned instructions. The Janbhagidari resources are utilized for the urgent needs of the academic and infrastructural development of the college. In a nutshell, all the funds are utilized keeping in view the enhancement of the academic quality and strengthening of the infrastructure of the institute.

Procedures:

The various departments of the institution IQAC and other important committees submit their proposals to the principal. After a review of the proposals, the finance committee chaired by the principal allocates the budget. Then the purchase committee floats tender as per Chhattisgarh government purchasing Norms, The quotation Process and Purchasing are done through the open tender Gem and CG Manak portal. The tender is finally given to the L1 as per the recommendations of the purchase committee. Then the Principal sends a purchase order to the L1 firm the item is received and verified by the concerning departments/store. After verifying the purchased item the bill and purchased item is put up to the Upper-division clerk who further puts it to the principal for payment. The Principal then forwards the bill to the account section again checks the procedure and after getting satisfied with the purchasing procedure, then pays the bill through RTGS/ Cheque/ Bank Draft. Finally, the internal auditor Shri R. K. Yadav checks the whole procedure for transparency and authenticity.

FOLK CULTURE

Aim:

India is a huge nation with diverse cultures and civilizations. The birth of any culture is a plurality. Human generations keep on adding or subtracting something from it. That is why every culture has its specialty. We get a glimpse of that particular area in the folk culture. Our college is situated in ancient Dandakaranya and presently Naryanpur of Bastar region. This area is famous for Madia culture. The main purpose of our organization is also to preserve the cultural heritage of the Abhujmad region.

Context:

We are going away from the folk culture due to the excessive love for urbanization and materialism, the future generation also has not much love for folk culture. So, it is very important to introduce the youth to the native or indigenous culture. Here is the Abhujamadh region situated in the southwest direction from Narayanpur district headquarter. The residents of Abhujamaadh are known as Abhujamadh. It is very difficult to reach here. The Madia society is very backward even today. They live with nature-provided resources.

Practice:

There are so many cultures in Madia society, in which PEN KAKSAD is the main.

PEN KAKSAD

The meaning of PEN KAKSAD- "Pen kaksad " in which pen means God or Goddess and Kaksad means festival of God and Goddess or the game of the Gods. Kakadu is a Gotra festival of Abhujamadh and Madia tribes of south Bastar. Pen Kaksad festival starts every year between January and May.

Purpose of Pen Kaksad:

- Correctively worshipping the Rishta deities and natural energies with traditional rituals.
- To keep the religious belief and traditions alive.
- Tie the family members in one tread.
- To transfer the culture from one generation to another generation.
- To promote unity, brotherhood, and love behavior in society.
- To keep social unity strong.
- To help one another in society and to participate in each other's happiness and sorrow.
- To create social harmony.
- To prevent social disintegration and breakdowns.
- To spread the joy of life through 'PEN KAKSAD'.

GAUR DANCE

This folk dance is performed during 'KAKSAD' time. In which the people of Madia tribes dance by wearing the horn of buffalo. Our organization is preserving the culture of "Pen Kaksad". We are promoting the culture of 'pen ka sad; and its purpose through our organization. By making the college students aware of this culture, our organization encourages them to sing and dance. There are also students of 'Madia' society in our college. They are advised to stay connected to this folk culture and never leave. In fact 'Pen Kaksad' folk culture is not only important for Madia society but its purpose is the welfare of the entire human race.

Success and Proof:

Our organization is getting positive results from this effort. The students and employees who were not aware of this folk culture, are now taking awareness and trying to promote this culture. Kakadu dance is given a special place in the programs organized by the college. Many objectives of Pen Kakasad are being adopted by the college family and then also trying to follow them. Students are promoting brotherhood and loving behavior in society through this culture.

The problems encountered during the work and necessary resources:

The organization didn't face any problems during this exercise. With the effort of the principal in charge and his relation with the tribe, no special obstacle was faced in knowing and understanding this folk dance Pen Kaksad, and Gaur Dance. For this exercise, any special resources are not required; the costumes used in Pen Kaksad and Gaur dance have to be arranged. The instrument "Madri" is used in these dances.

2. Best practice

ENVIRONMENT FRIENDLY

Aim:

Human life is completely dependent on nature. Nature fulfills all the needs of man directly or indirectly. Trees are the most important and useful for humans. Trees are responsible for providing food, and oxygen as well as in bring rain. Due to the benefits of trees in every way for human life, our organization has started an effort to make our college, a green campus. The purpose of these efforts is environmental protection, awareness of the environment among the students and society as well as extensive recycling and composting of the waste materials on the campus.

Context:

Today, the problem of pollution is the leading problem in most of the metropolitan cities of India. The main reason for this problem is the excessive reduction of trees. It is the irony of the human race that if the human race is reduced or destroyed, then it will be beneficial for the trees, but if the tree is reduced or destroyed, then the existence of mankind will be in danger. The students learn a lot from the environment, so if we give them a green environment, then it is natural that they will have consciousness of their environment. Our organization is working on the future needs of human beings. Due to daily urbanization, almost all the cities have negligible individual land. The presence of trees is found only in government institutions.

Practice:

Our college has worked at many levels to protect the environment and save and enhance natural resources. Our college is completely smoke-free and plastic wastes are also negligible. In its programs, our organization makes students aware not to smoke and use plastic to a minimum. We manufacture compost from plant residues and other wastes in establishing flowers and some other plants in the nursery of the college itself.

Firstly a full-time worker was required for this type of work. Therefore, in 2018 the organization appointed a Gardener in collaboration with the public participation committee. The work of this Gardener is purely Garden work on campus and he is doing his job wholeheartedly. Our organization has many types of plants like fruit plants, flowering plants, medicinal plants, etc. We can classify the different types of plants on the college campus as follows-

2. Medicinal plants
3. Flowering plants
4. Vegetable
5. Shady/other plants

Along with the environment, our college also pays special attention to cleanliness. From time to time cleanliness campaigns are conducted by NSS. We are also aware of the students about cleanliness.

Proof of Success:

Our efforts in promoting the environment are moving towards complete success. Some trees are not seen in any institution elsewhere such as the Sulfi tree, Red Sandalwood, Sinduri tree, Mahua, Kadamba, Sal (state tree), Litchi, Kirundi, Hazari flower, etc. but they are present in our college. 7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

Narayanpur district is one of the severely Naxal affected districts of the Bastar division of Chhattisgarh. Our college is located at the district headquarters of Narayanpur district.

The geographical structure of this district is favorable for Naxalites. On its western border is a district named Gadchiroli of Maharashtra state. Gadchiroli is also included in the worst Naxal-affected districts. Narayanpur does not have direct connectivity with the Gadchiroli headquarters as there is a lack of direct roads. There is no road in Narayanpur in front of Sonpur, there are hills of Abujhmad and dense forest which is friendly to Naxalites.

Narayanpur district also shares the borders of Kanker, Kondagaon, Bastar, Dantewada, and Bijapur districts of Chhattisgarh. All these districts of Chhattisgarh state are also affected and oppressed by Naxalism. Out of these, Bijapur, Sukma, and Dantewada are currently the most Naxal-affected districts in the whole of India.

Any ideology or organization wants to spread its agenda. Similarly, Naxalite organizations also want their ideology to be propagated and more and more youths to join their organization. For this, they also mislead the villagers in wrong and right ways. In many villages of the Mand area, it is completely forbidden for any outsider to go. Even the teachers of the schools have to go to school only and not to anyone in the village. Naxalites also want that no person should be recruited into the army or police. Many villagers of the district had to leave their village just because someone from their family had joined the police or the army. Many youths whose dream was to join the police or army, had to give up their dream even after getting selected because if they went to the army or police then Naxalites could kill their family.

Many such students in our institute come from villages affected by Naxalite ideology. Those students may also be directly or indirectly influenced by Naxalite ideology. Keeping in mind the future of the students and the upliftment of the nation, it is the endeavor of our institution that the spirit of nationalism should be propagated among the students. For this, many employees of the institution and especially the principal keeps talking to the students from time to time. In his address to the students on 26th January and 15th August, the Principal endeavors to spread the feeling of nationalism among them.

From time to time, the Principal and teachers also talk to the students of the hostel and also motivate them on appropriate occasions. In his address and during the conversation with the students, the Principal and teachers also take care that the students should be oriented toward the feeling of nationalism.

The violent form of Naxalite ideology gives a double whammy to the nation. If a Naxalite is killed in a police Naxalite encounter, it may be that he is a talented youth, who if he was not a Naxalite, would have taken the society and the nation forward with his ability and talent, and if any member of the police or paramilitary force is martyred then it is a direct loss to the society and the nation. It is also worth considering that anyone who dies is a loss to the motherland.

The specialty of the principal of our institution is that he can speak Gondi very well. The main dialect of

the tribals of the Bastar division is Gondi. The principal talks to the students coming from inside, mainly in Gondi so that the students can feel familiar. The principal and some employees of the institution want us to go to the inner village and talk to the villagers, but it can be more harmful to us. Because of this compulsion, we have to confine our activities to the institution.

Many students of our institution are doing service to society and the nation by joining the police, paramilitary forces, and army. Taking inspiration from these, many students are trying to join the security forces. A student of our institute, Shaheed Devnath Pujari, has also been martyred in the Naxalite encounter. The college family pays tribute to him at every national festival. At present, Shaheed Devnath Pujari is the role model for many students of the institution.

Naxalite activity has been reduced in Narayanpur district as per official figures and in reality. About 10-15 years ago today, Dadaman (Naxal) used to roam in the district headquarters, but now he has been confined in the inner areas where they used to roam freely wearing uniforms but now they remain secretly.

We do not say that it is the result of our efforts. Governance has an important role in this outcome. But somewhere our small effort is also helpful in this work. We feel that the Naxalite ideology to be completely eradicated in the district for its proper development. and even after that, our organization will continue to do this type of work, understanding its duties towards society and nation-building. May God and Budhadev bless us with success.
